NATURAL INHERITANCE .- In reading Mr. Darwin's most valuable and interesting work. " The Variation of Plants and Animals," &c., the following circumstance recurred to my memory. One day, many years ago, the late Mr. T. Crofton Croker showed me the portrait in an old book, concessing the title-page, and asked me did I know suvone whom it was like? "To be snre I do." said I. "it is the very image of John Herrick." The book was the Poems of Robert Herrick. and printed in the middle of the seventeenth century : and John Herrick was a gentleman living in the county of Cork, whom we both knew. He always asserted that he was of the same family as the poet : and as the latter had. I believe, no children, he could not be his descendant, and so the likeness must have come from a more remote ancestor. As far as I know. none of J. Herrick's family had the same cast of conntenance. I think I have read somewhere that, in the present century, a lady descended from the Wicliff family bare a striking resemblance to the reformer .--Notes and Oueries.
