whose authority he published
the letter, & whether he knew
of your having refused to let
the Baron publish it. This he
must answer, & then you
will know how to proceed & -
pardon your friend's
presumption.

There was no more beautiful
Charade in your father's whole
life, than his respectful attitude
towards conscientious religious
beliefs, or his refraining to allow
his name, & ^{his opinions} to be showed in their
faces: "I declare I would
rather be stepped in ritualism,
or in any other - rather, than
share the German sentiments &
attitude in these matters.

In writing to Rachel I should
revised being to announce
in Boston - & perhaps wish that

It is not jealousy of forestalment
that instigates you writing, but
the knowledge of
feelings which ~~you have~~ would
have been your father's feelings in
respect of the publication of his
letter. - Of this does not touch
our victory with.
