Dear Sir, I shall of course feel
much honoured by your publishing
any letter I may have received from
your illustrious father.

The one about Moel Tryfan,
North Wales (dated Nov. 13th 1880)
which you have marked but not
numbered, I think ought to be pub-
lished, as your father was the earliest
worker in that part of North Wales.

The ^{short} letter marked (but not
numbered) about article from James
Geikie is important, as it mainly
Dec. 21, 1880

refers to the slaty laminae on
Moel Tryfan (North Wales) with
a particular reference to the
manner in which they have been
bent. I wrote to your father to
say that they had been bent on
nearly level ground in a ^{way} ~~manner~~
in which the action of ice alone
would explain.

The letter marked 2 (Oct 16th 1879)
ought to have the following note
appended (as a footnote) after the
word Secretaries* In the same
letter your father asks me to explain
the term "overshot loads." If you
think it desirable you might add
that I meant loads of boulders which
had been carried over ~~the~~ part of the
